NYC Schools Account (NYCSA)

All parents/guardians must set up a NYC schools account (NYCSA), which is a web based application that lets you see and manage important information about your child on any computer, cellphone, or tablet.

In the account, you can see a child's:

- Attendance
- Grades & Report Cards, Test Scores
- Enrollment History
- Transportation
- Individualized Education Program (IEP)
- Emergency Contact & Student Health Information

How do I create an account? You can create a NYCSA account by using the information that your school will provide you with. New students, see the Parent Coordinator for your temporary password. Go to <http://mystudent.nyc>, enter your email address and temporary password. If you need this information, call Ms. Licettee Mercado, Parent Coordinator at 718-299-6128. You will be asked to create a new password for your account, set up your security questions, and confirm your email address. You should complete these steps within 30 days of receiving your temporary password, or else the password will expire. If you need assistance, a school staff member can help you create the account in-person or online.

• **Report cards will be made available for you to access through your (NYCSA) three times a year in November, March and June.**



NYC Kids RISE Save for College Program - All families with Kindergarten, 1st Grade, 2nd, 3rd and 4th grade students enrolled in a NYC public school, regardless of income or immigration status, are eligible to participate in this savings program. Sanford Harmony Program

We are proud to utilize the Sanford Harmony program, which engages students daily in lessons and activities that promote the development of key social-emotional skills. These include:

- **Self-Awareness:** Understanding one's emotions and values.
- **Self-Management:** Regulating emotions and behaviors.
- **Social Awareness:** Showing empathy and understanding toward others.
- **Relationship Skills:** Building and maintaining positive relationships.
- **Responsible Decision-Making:** Making ethical and constructive choices.

Through this program, students learn the skills needed to build positive connections with their peers, develop empathy, and navigate challenges responsibly.

Partnership with Sandy Hook Promise

In our continued efforts to create a safer, kinder, and healthier school community, we have partnered with Sandy Hook Promise. This partnership equips us with programs and resources aimed at preventing violence, identifying signs of distress, and promoting a culture of inclusivity and kindness among students.

Collaboration with Child Mind Institute

PS 236 Expectations for Behavior

School-Wide Non-Negotiables

The following behaviors are considered non-negotiable and are essential for maintaining a safe, respectful, and positive school environment:

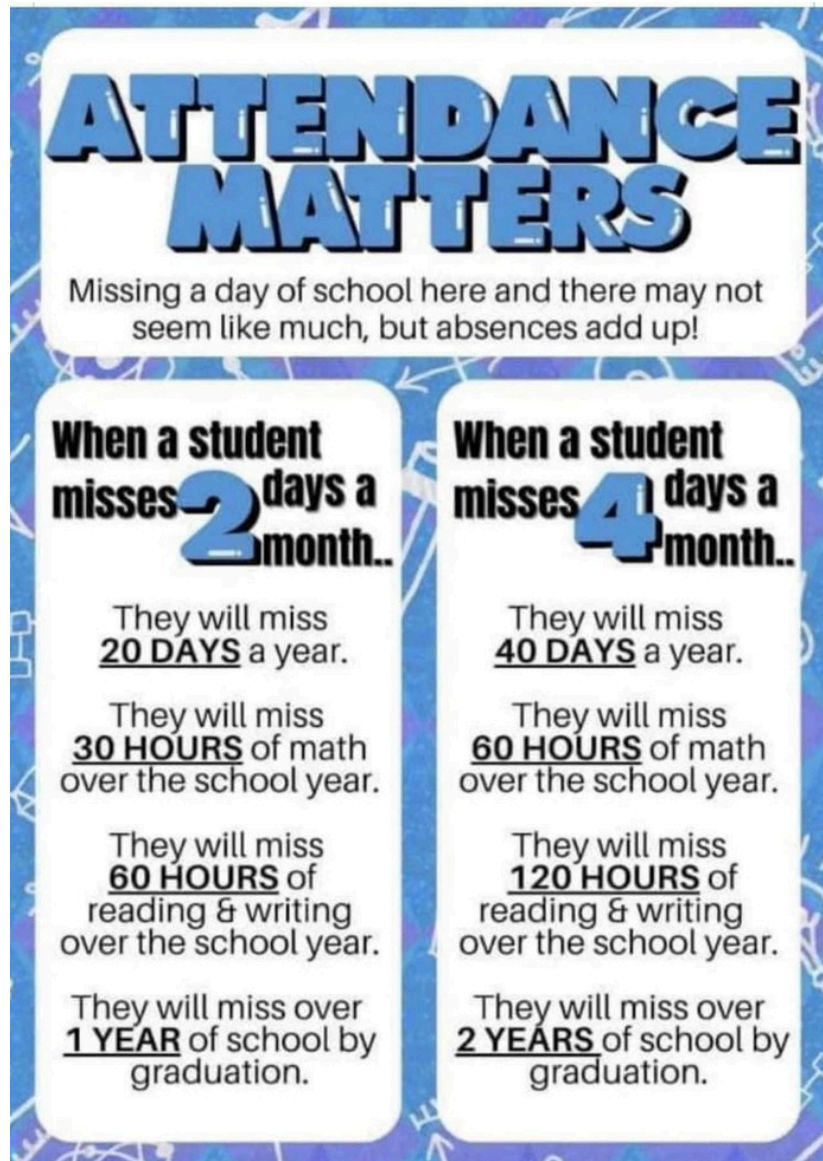
- **Respect for Others:** All students are expected to show respect toward fellow students, staff, and visitors at all times. **Bullying, harassment, and discriminatory behavior will not be tolerated.**
- **Safe Conduct:** Students must act in ways that ensure the safety of themselves and others. **Physical aggression (fighting) and actions that may lead to harm are prohibited.**
- **Engagement in Learning:** Students are expected to be active participants in their own learning, which includes following instructions, completing assignments, and remaining focused during lessons.
- **Respect for Property:** Students must respect school property, as well as the personal property of others.

School-Wide Consequences

When students do not meet behavior expectations, consequences may include:

- **Verbal Warning:** A teacher or staff member will remind the student of the expected behavior.
- **Restorative Conversation:** The student will engage in a discussion about their behavior, reflecting on its impact and exploring ways to repair any harm caused.
- **Parent/Guardian Notification:** Families will be informed of repeated or severe behaviors and involved in creating a plan for improvement.
- **Behavior Reflection:** Students may be required to complete a written reflection on their behavior or engage in a restorative action to make amends.
- **Loss of Privileges:** Certain privileges may be revoked, such as participation in extracurricular activities or recess.
- **Restorative Practice/ Reflection Session:** Assigned time for students to reflect on their behavior after school.

Attendance and Lateness



The school gate opens at 7:50am for arrival. The school day officially begins at 8:00am every day. **Students are expected to attend school every day and maintain 93% or higher attendance.** After an absence, please send a note from the doctor or parent/guardian explaining why the child was absent. Attendance will be taken by the classroom teacher daily. All students are expected to arrive on time for class and will be marked late if they arrive after 8:00 am. Students who arrive after 8:00am must sign the late book at the security desk. Dismissal is at 2:20pm (Kindergarten through 5th Grade) and 2:10pm for PreK every day.

*Late students will not be eligible to receive a monthly attendance award.

Arrival

- All students in **Kindergarten to 5th Grade** enter through the schoolyard . Gates open at 7:50am. The school day starts at 8:00am.
- All students in **Pre-K** enter through the main entrance (Exit 3). Doors open at 8:10am. The school day begins at 8:15am for Pre-K.

Dismissal

*****Please be on time to pick up your child.*****

Pre-K will be dismissed from the main entrance (Exit 3). The door will open at 2:00pm and close at 2:15pm. Please note, if you arrive after 2:15pm, you will have to wait until the School Safety Agent returns to open the door at 2:35pm.

Students in Grades Kindergarten through 5th Grade will be dismissed at 2:20pm from the schoolyard. If you arrive after 2:30pm, you will need to come to Exit 3 to pick up your child.

For students who are picked up by an adult: **Only adults listed on the Emergency Contact Form may pick up students with proper identification.** Students in Grades 3-5 will only be dismissed to walk home alone with a signed authorization form from a parent/guardian. Students in grades PreK through 2nd Grade will only be released to siblings with a signed permission slip giving the older sibling permission to pick up the student.

Early Pickups

If your child has to be picked up early for an appointment, please notify the main office by phone, and also the teacher in advance by writing an email, text, letter or sending a message on class dojo, indicating the time the student will be picked up. Please notify the school if another adult has permission to pick up your child early. Only adults 18 or older who are listed on the Emergency Contact Form will be allowed to pick up students.

How can you support your child's education?



#1 Ensuring Regular Attendance: Send your child to school on time and ready to learn every day.

#2 Staying Informed: Be aware of your child's work, progress, and any challenges by reading school notices, talking to your child about their day, reviewing their assignments, and checking progress reports. Meet with your child's teacher when needed.

#3 Communicating with the School: Maintain regular contact with your child's teachers and principal to stay updated on their education. Communicate verbally or in writing as needed.

#4 Following School Policies: Adhere to all school policies and applicable Chancellor's Regulations related to your child's education.

#5 Responding Promptly: Reply to all communications from the school, whether by phone, email, letter, text, ClassDojo, or other methods, in a timely manner.

#6 Attending School Meetings: Attend all requested meetings and conferences that pertain to your child's education and development.

#7 Updating Contact Information: Ensure the school has your up-to-date contact information (e.g., home address, phone number, email address). If you need help creating an email address, our Parent Coordinator, Licettee Mercado, is available to assist you.

#8 Teach the Importance of Respect and Safety: Reinforce the importance of respecting the property, safety, and rights of others. Teach your child to refrain from engaging in intimidating, harassing, or discriminatory behavior.

#9 Create a Supportive Home Environment: Provide a home setting where education is a priority and your child has the support they need to succeed.

#10 Join the Parent Association: Become an active member of the school's Parent Association or Parent-Teacher Association to support your child and the school.

Academic Programs Our curricula is aligned to the Next Generation Standards:

The Next Generation Standards provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them. The standards are designed to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in college and careers. In order to help students achieve Next Generation Standards, our teachers have created units that help support students in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Grades K-5 use HMH Into Reading to integrate additional resources to their curriculum.

In addition, students use Wilson Foundations (Grades K-2) and Phonics for Reading (Grades 3-5) to support phonics. All students also have access to iReady (online), where they can practice their reading skills and math daily. In Mathematics, we utilize Eureka Math Squared and Zearn to provide instruction. In Science, we utilize Amplify to create a hands-on STEM based curriculum. We use the Passport to Social Studies for our Social Studies curriculum.



Academic Intervention Services

AIS (Academic Intervention Services) will be provided during the day for students identified through the Response to Intervention (RTI) process standards.

Multi-Tiered Student Support (MTSS). The School Based Support Team (SBST) works together to create academic plans to reduce the number of students referred to Special Education. If you feel that your child needs extra services, please discuss with your child's teacher.

Grading Policy

At PS 236, we use multiple criteria to determine student grades.

Prekindergarten

Students in Pre-K receive holistic progress reports: Teaching Strategies Gold (TSG) 3 times per school year.

Kindergarten- Grade 5

Students receive report cards in November, March and June during the school year. We use a four point rubric as the basis for determining report cards grades, and classroom and benchmark assessments aligned to the four- point rubric.

Homework/Academic Policy

Students in grades K to 5th grade receive homework daily. Homework is to be completed and returned to the class according to the teacher's expectations. Homework should be completed to the best of each student's ability.

Parents/guardians should offer supportive guidance or feedback as needed. The student should complete homework. Our teachers are committed to ensuring that every child's homework is worthwhile. DIAL-A-TEACHER is available for parents to assist them with their child's homework. Call 212-777-3380. It is also available in different languages.

Report Cards and Parent Teacher Conferences (PTC) (Need to direct them to NYCSA account for report cards)

Report cards will be distributed three times during the school year: November, March and June. Parents/Guardians are expected to meet with teachers during PTC to receive their child's report card in November and March to speak with the teacher regarding their child's progress in school. Final report cards will be distributed on the last day of school.

If you are unable to attend any of the days above, please schedule an appointment with your child's teacher.

Awards Celebrations

PS. 236 awards and recognizes students for academic and social achievement! Awards will be given to students who show significant improvement in academics and/or behavior, Student of the Month and 100% Attendance that includes not being late. In order to achieve awards, students must adhere to PS. 236's Uniform Policy and Code of Discipline.

Uniform Policy

PS. 236 has a uniform policy which is intended to support our school and promote a more effective learning climate, improve student performance, eliminate label competition, simplify dressing and minimize cost for all parents.

The uniform color is:

Royal blue polo shirt and any color pants. Sneakers are mandatory on gym days. Please note that **students are not allowed to wear Crocs and sandals to school** for safety reasons. These types of footwear do not provide the support and protection during school activities, including physical education (Gym) and outdoor recess.

Students are required to wear their PS 236 shirt on **class trips**. This assists in easy recognition of the PS. 236 students.



BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

Birthdays are very special and exciting days for all of us. It's a time to celebrate "us" with friends and family. As a school, we want to continue recognizing our students' special day while being sensitive to student allergies, and financial hardships.

With that said, we have moved away from edible treats for birthdays and are replacing them with non-food celebrations. Some options we have considered include: Whole class sings happy birthday, student wears a special hat, student gets to read their favorite book and or has a mystery/family reader come to school (this would need to be coordinated with classroom teachers), play a special game, and their birthday is announced during morning announcements.

Together we can continue to celebrate our students in a healthy and positive way!

Lost and Found

If your child lost an item, please meet with our Parent Coordinator, Ms. Mercado to look through the lost and found bin. Please label all of your child's clothing and possessions with his/her name and class number. It is easier to retrieve lost items that have been labeled, so please label outerwear, lunchboxes and backpacks. PS 236 is not responsible for any lost or stolen items. On the last day of every month, everything that is not claimed will be donated to charity.

Recess

Students have the opportunity to opt out of recess every day. Students go outside during all seasons weather permitting. Please make sure students come to school with appropriate clothing. In order for students to participate in recess, they must be wearing comfortable clothing and closed-toe shoes. Please label your child's clothes/belongings with their first and last name.

School Trips

Field trips are excellent extensions to learning. **Students must have a permission slip signed by their parent or legal guardian prior to the date of the trip.** No student will be permitted to attend a field trip without written permission from a parent or guardian. Students may bring their own lunches. Please indicate on the student's consent form if you cannot provide lunch. A school lunch can be provided. All parents should familiarize themselves with the NYC Department of Education regulations to ensure that school trips are productive, educational and safe experiences for students, parents and staff, as well as enjoyable.

Parent/Guardian Chaperone Responsibilities

- Check in with teachers if you would like to chaperone a field trip.
- Please report to the school at 8:30AM if you are chaperoning a trip.
- All chaperones must be 18 years old and over if you are a chaperone on a trip and you must provide your cell number.
- Be authorized to attend trips. Anyone not authorized before the trip, cannot attend.
- Ask if you have to pay for the trip.
- If an emergency comes up and you are unable to attend the trip, please inform the teacher or school as soon as possible.
- Only use professional language during the trip.
- Must return to school with class.
- Please stay off the cell phone (If you need to use the phone, please inform the teacher).
- Communicate with the teacher before the trip to be assigned.
- Remain with the class at all times, and assist the teacher.
- Siblings, including young children are not allowed on trips.



Emergency Contact Cards

Every student will receive a blue Emergency Contact Card AND a white Emergency Contact Form. The cards and form ask for important information about whom the school may contact in case of emergency. It is important that the information is accurate and up to date at all times. Phone numbers or address changes must be reported to the school.

If you are planning to move or already have moved, please inform Ms. Maggie Mendez Gil, our School Secretary, (718-299- 6128). We will need the moving date, your new address, new telephone number (if any) and cell number. We will also need the new school name and address (if known).

Please inform our social worker, Ms. Camilo, Ms. Mercado, our Parent Coordinator or your child's teacher if your child gets hurt at home. In order to keep the safety of your students at the top of our priority. We may need to discuss with your child the incident that occurred in order to support your child.

Letters

Any letters needed must be requested two days in advance. Parents and Guardians are asked to sign the book entitled "Parent Letters" in the main office. The letter will be processed and ready for pickup in 2 days. No one other than the parent or guardian may pick up any requested letters.

School Messenger

Your main contact number will be used for our phone calls and you will receive parent letters to the email address you provided on the emergency contact form. Please make sure the main number you provided is the number you want the school to call you using the automated school messenger system. If you are not receiving school messenger phone calls or emails. Let the office staff know so we can change your phone number or email in our ATS computer system.

Class Dojo

Classroom teachers will send you an invitation to Class Dojo. Please be sure to sign up as this is another important method for communicating with school staff.

Health Program

All students must meet all New York State requirements regarding immunizations and physical examinations. All students must have a yearly physical and submit the completed form to the office.

School Meal Programs

Breakfast

Breakfast is served daily in the classroom for students in all grades (Pre-K to 5th Grade). Breakfast begins at 8:00am and ends at 8:20am. Students are not permitted to enter the building before 7:50 am because there is NO supervision before 7:50 am. Please note the school is not responsible for students dropped off before 7:50 am.

Lunch

Lunch is available each day in the cafeteria. Students are permitted to bring healthy bag lunches and snacks. NO glass bottles, please! If your child has any food allergies, please bring a letter from the doctor for the school nurse to verify your child's allergy. Menus are available on the DOE website. (Students should not bring candy, gum or soda to school).

HEALTHY SNACK POLICY

We kindly ask for your support to strengthen the minds and bodies of our students. Please **do not** send your child to school with snacks or lunches that have a lot of sugar, fat such as fried chips, soda, colored/artificial drinks, packaged snack cakes, chocolate bars, gummies or candy. If your child comes to school with what we deem as an unhealthy snack, it will be taken away and returned at the end of the day.

NEW Cell Phone and Electronic Device Policy

New York City Public Schools (NYCPS) is implementing a citywide policy for **distraction-free** learning, per New York State law.

All NYC public schools will prohibit the use of personal cell phones and internet-enabled electronic devices—such as smartphones, tablets, and smart watches—during the school day.

Students may bring personal devices, but cannot use them during class or on school grounds unless an exception applies.

All schools will provide:

A method of securing storage of personal electronic devices

(e.g., pouches, storage lockers, or collection bins).

A way for families to contact their child during the school day.
